#731 OLIVER JEWETT, born February 24, 1747 in Pepperell, Mass.; died August 22, 1829. He lived in Bolton, Mass. and served 3 enlistments in the Revolution from that town. As a corporal, he "marched on the alarm of Apr. 19, 1775." He also served 2 enlistments as a Sergeant.

Mrs. Crawford's genealogy appeared in the 1973 Year Book.

Patriot Ancestor of Doris Hosley Cambridge:

JAMES HOSLEY (HORSLEY) of New Ipswich and Townsend, Mass., and Hancock, N. H., answered the Lexington alarm and was a captain in the Revolution.

Patriot Ancestor of Mrs. Hiles of Long Beach, Cal.:

#761 LT. DANIEL JEWETT, born in Manchester, Mass. on February 24, 1843-4; died in Putney, Vt. on March 19, 1829. He "marched to the assistance of his compatriots at Lexington and Concord; — was nominated on February 6, 1776, to be a First Lieutenant; — attained the rank of Captain about 1779, and returned to Putney after the war." He was a prisoner at Ft. Ticonderoga for six month, according to the Jewett Genealogy.

Patriot Ancestor of Virginia G. Jewett of Elgin, Ill.:

#360 JONATHAN JEWETT, private of Rindge, N. H., born March 12, 1739; died April 28, 1786; married Martha Belcher.

Patriot Ancestor of Clifford L. Jewett of Bloomington, Minn.:

JOSEPH DANFORTH, JR., the father of Mary Danforth, wife of Jonas Jewett (#1533). Private Danforth of Dunstable was in Col. Eben Bridge's Regiment of Minute Men who marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775 to Cambridge. He was Mr. Jewett's great-great-great-grandfather.

Patriot Ancestor of Mrs. Madeleine Lindsay of Detroit, Mich., and many of the Jewett Family living in Michigan:

#666 ICHABOD JEWETT, born in Norwich, Conn. on February 5, 1738; died May 1, 1796. Served in Ninth Co., Norwich; Conn., and marched from Coventry, Conn. on the Lexington Alarm. He was also in the Battle of Bunker Hill. Several of his young sons also served.

Heraldry In America

This entire comment is taken from The New England Historical and Genealogical Record, Vol. 12, p. 289, October, 1858.

— — — Any coat of arms that was to be found in New England during the score of years following the first coloniattion of Plymouth and Massachusetts, the owner's social position in England was among the gentry or yeomanry.

There are three classes of coats of arms:

1) Those of any man's ancestors used for a long time, cause for adoption of arms is not to be discovered. We must trust to the strictness with which this privilege was formerly guarded for a guarantee that the arms were justly appropriated.

2) Those coats of arms granted by the Herald's College, or by royal command, as a reward for distinguished service. These are very honorable.

3) Those granted by the Herald's College on payment of a fee. These are not of any value at present (1858) to the genealogist and are hardly a source of much comfort to the possessor. This is a fairly new idea, but some date prior to the settlement of New England.

Coats of arms brought to America by early colonists are genuine because no one in America had the skill to cut and set a seal before 1700 or 1750.

It is not proof of a falsity if one's coat of arms is not found in Burke's or Berry's. There being no official record extant, those books can only verify those arms they record, not damn those they ignore.

It can be stated without fear of contradiction that any family whose early American ancestor used a coat of arms possesses a noble cornerstone to erect its English pedigree on.

JEWETT FAMILY REUNION IN FRESNO, CALIFORNIA

This interesting account of the annual Thanksgiving Gathering of one branch of the Family in California is sent by Clarence Burr, of Oakland, Cal. Thank you very much, Sir.

Fifty-two guests had a wonderful time at the home of my daughter, Mary, her husband and four children (three young sons and one daughter), in Fresno, Cal. Forty-three were related to my mother, Ada Jewett, oldest sister of Hugh Jewett. Hugh, by the way, was the oldest and last of his generation at Thanksgiving. Ada married Emil Burr, whose grandfather was Mayor of San Francisco in the Vigilante days, and also the founder of the Clay St. Bank, today the Wells Fargo Bank. Emil, known as Will, had five boys and one daughter. All boys married and except for my oldest brother, Edmund, all had children. All of this group, except one, were in attendance and, of course, their children. So you can readily see that this family has really kept together, celebrating and giving thanks on this holiday. It has become a tradition and for over eighty years has been celebrated by the Jewetts and Burrs.

Hugh gave a most interesting account of the early days of Kern County, particularly the area around Bakersfield. He told of the two Jewett brothers, Solomon and Phil, how they walked across the plains in 1859, and found the land along the Kern River, which was to become large sheep ranches. The Jewetts had been leaders in breeding fine sheep in Vermont in the 1830-40s, so the two brothers knew something about that industry. They developed many of the firsts in Kern County. They planted cotton and proved it could be grown on a commercial basis; also set up the first store in Bakersfield. His talk was most interesting and afforded a beautiful opportunity for the younger generation to get a better feeling for this family. I am convinced that the Thanksgiving gathering will continue to grow and will survive. So many of the husbands and wives have spoken of how they thoroughly enjoy this gathering. It never had taken place in their families. One and all look forward to next year.

You might wonder how one household can put it on. One, alone, doesn't! All bring something which is organized before. Mary, with her family of four has a large rumpus room, which looks into an open kitchen,

which has a long tile serving counter. There is enough room to seat forty in this room. Another room off the kitchen, the real dining room, will seat a dozen and so the 10-15 year olds are placed there with a cousin, an older boy or girl, and they have their own party and get to know each other better. One must remember these young people live miles apart, from south of Los Angeles to five-hundred-fifty miles north to Carson City, Nevada, in between Bakersfield, Turlock, Arnold (in the old Mother Lode area), far north to Eureka, where one attends Humboldt State University. So they don't see each other too often.

The meal is served buffet style. A program is prepared, newly weds give a short talk and others, having been on trips, expecting, etc., all get into the act. Sometimes slides or movies are shown. The highlight was Hugh's talk this year. Last year I spliced together some 200 ft. of former Thanksgiving gatherings, some taken thirty years ago, and they made me show it three times. Some in those pictures had passed away, like my mother and father, but it was history of the family and brought back happy memories.

Fresno is pretty well situated, about the center. Mary gets rooms in motels for all those staying overnight, so no one has to rush off.

The Jewett Brothers, Pioneers Of Kern County, California

The following two stories were compiled by Clarence C. Burr, grandson of Philo D. Jewett (#4839), from material furnished by Hugh S. Jewett (#7344), son of Philo D. Jewett.

This story begins with an excerpt from the diary of Philo D. Jewett, written at his and his brother's Kern River Ranch, Tulare County, California, January 27, 1862:

"I little thought when I left off writing in my Daily Journal, over three years ago, that when I next commenced to keep it — it would be in the lower part of California, among Indians and half-civilized people, but thus it is and many are the changes which I wish were chronicled in this book, and so I must let the past go and attend the present."

Solomon (#4838) and Philo Dennis Jewett (#4839) were brothers and the sons of Solomon K. Jewett, one of Vermont's outstanding citizens in the 19th century. The Jewett farm was at Weybridge, Vermont.

The family moved to Racine, Wisconsin, in 1856, where the brothers attended and graduated from Racine College in 1858.

In the spring of 1859 Solomon and Philo, energetic and adventurous, and in the prime of life, decided to seek their fortune in the west. They started for Pike's Peak with an ox team. About three hundred miles west, they received the news that the Pike's Peak gold rush was a bust. Not daunted by the turn of events, they decided to join a party of pioneers bound for California. This required walking the entire distance, across plains, mountains, and desert, some two thousand miles. On September 1859, five months later, they reached the mining camp of Hangtown, (now Placerville) California, one of the better-known motherlode towns, approximately fifty miles east of Sacramento.

While resting at Hangtown, the brothers agreed to separate. Solomon was to go on to the great valley in California, looking for prospective sheep land and ranges. Philo to return, over the Sierras, to the Carson Valley, at that time part of Utah Territory, today Nevada. In the valley he purchased a team of horses and a wagon. He realized the potential of the draying business of transporting needed lumber and supplies to the Comstock silver mines, recently discovered. He remained in this area a year, and was quite successful.

The two brothers had agreed before going their separate ways to meet again in California in 1860.

Solomon went south to the end of the Central Valley (now the San Joaquin) some three hundred miles. The Kern River at this point comes out on the plains, and it was along the sides of this river that Solomon found the sheep lands he was looking for. It was there in 1860 that the Rio Bravo Ranch would be located, and the beginning of the Jewett brothers ranching and sheep raising operations.

Philo, having disposed of his drayage business, purchased stock which he left in the Carson Valley while he went to California. There he found Solomon who informed him of the fine sheep land he had acquired. The

brothers returned to the Carson Valley — drove the sheep to California, and embarked in the stock business at the Rio Bravo holdings. This was in the late fall of 1860. Soon Philo was to run this operation—while Solomon, more interested in business, opened the first store in Bakersfield in the early sixties. He formed a partnership with Julius Chester, an early settler. As their holdings prospered, the two brothers bought 2000 acres of choice land adjoining Bakersfield. This was later, in 1874, to become the home ranch of the Jewett brothers.

While Philo remained at the Rio Bravo ranch till 1874 tending the thousands of sheep, Solomon, successful in the merchandise business, agreed to sell their Rio Bravo holdings and move their operations to the ranch lands adjoining Bakersfield. The Rio Bravo was sold for \$42,000, a good price in those days.

In 1874 Solomon and Philo were two incorporators of the Kern County Bank, the first bank in that area. Solomon became president of this bank and was connected with it till his death in Bakersfield December 26, 1905.

Another first for the two brothers was the raising of the first commercial crop of cotton in 1865 on 120 acres. However, due to the ending of the Civil War, causing cotton to fall to 25¢ per pound, plus the scarcity and high cost of labor, the venture was unprofitable, and so cotton raising was abandoned.

In 1885 Philo moved his family to San Francisco. Not one to take life easily, he soon ventured into the salt water baths with his brother-in-law, John Farnham. Known as the Crystal Baths, they were the largest and most complete salt water baths in the West. These baths burned in the earthquake and fire of 1906.

Philo was a member of the California Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of San Francisco, and of the California Commandery of No. 1 K.T. He also was a member of Islam Temple of the Shrine, and the order of Native Sons of Vermont of San Francisco. He died in San Francisco February 5, 1902. Besides his widow, he left three sons, Lathrop, Hugh S. and Phelps D. and two daughters, Adeline B., who married E. Willard Burr, and Helen K. Jewett.

CHARLES E. JEWETT (#4842)

A third member of the Solomon Jewett family, one Charles Elam Jewett, a half-brother of Solomon and Philo, also settled in Bakersfield. However, due to an illustrious service in the U.S. Army, he rose to the rank of Captain. It wasn't till 1876, when granted a year's leave from his army duties, that he came west. While visiting with his brothers, he bought a ranch on the slopes of Mt. Breckenridge, some 30 miles east of Bakersfield. He then resigned from the Army and lived on this property for three years. Here he built an ice house, which proved profitable, for ice was eagerly bought by the hotels and saloons in Bakersfield. In those early days ice was the only coolant. Charles put the ice up in blocks in the winter and they were sold at \$200 a ton in the hot summers of Kern County.

Charles moved from his mountain ranch to Bakersfield in 1880, and soon afterwards accepted the position of assistant cashier of the Kern County Bank, in which he continued to the time of his death May 30, 1892.

Charles Jewett was a devoted Episcopalian and for many years was

their Capacities would admit) ye conduct of Infernal Spirits under certain Restrictions: Having pass'd through those Savage Insults, we at length came to a hill nigh to the place where we at first engaged ye Enemy yt morning, we were here met by a number of Insolent Soldiers among whom was one Woman who appeared remarkably Mallicious and attempted several times to throw Stones at us, when one of our Guard Informed me yt her husband had been killed in this Days acion; we were then conducted down to a barn near ye water side, where we were drove into a Yard among a great number of Offrs & men who had been taken before us; soon after we came here, Capt. Jewett with a number of others were brought in & Confin'd with us; Capt Jewett had Rec'd two Wounds with a Bayonet after he was taken and Stripped of his Arms & part of this Cloths, one in ye brest & ye other in ye Belly, of which he Languished with great pain until ye Thirdsday following when he died; Sergt. Graves was also Stab'd in ye Thigh with a Bayonet after he was taken with Capt. Jewett, of which wound he recovered altho he after ward perished in Prison with many hundred others at N. York. After being sometime confined in this Yard Capt Jewett & others who were wounded were ordered to some place in order to have their Wounds dress'd, & I see no more of them this night. . . . Early next morning Capt. Jewett came to us in Excessive pain with his wounds already dress'd, but yet notwithstanding ye applications of several of ye Enemy's Cirgions, Especially one Doctor Howe (a young Scotch Gent) who treated him with great civility and tenderness, he Languished until ye Thirdsday following, (Viz 29 Augt at about 5 o'clock in ye morning) when he Expired & was Buried in an Orchard nigh sd House at 8 ye same moring, with as much Deacence as our present Situation would Admit; I myself (was) Indulged by Genll Grant, at ye application of Major Brown, who attended us in this place, to Attend ye Captain's Funeral; The aforesaid Majr Brown treated us with ye greatest Civility & Complaisance during our confinement in this place, Endeavoured to make our Accommodations as agreeable as possible: Genll Grant also was so good as to send us (with his compliments) two Quarters of Mutton well Cook'd & several Loves of Bread, which were Acceptable to us, as most of us had eat nothing since ye Monday before."

Part I, page 197: "Captain Joseph Jewett of Huntington's Continentals, perhaps defending himself to the last, even when escape was impossible, was three times stabbed with British bayonets after surrendering his sword. Cared for by a humane surgeon, but still after lingering in pain, he died . . . and was buried in the Bennett orchard. He left a family at Lyme, on the Connecticut, where he lived, and from where he went to join the army."

A soldier who fought on Long Island (Deacon N. Richard's statement in Vermont Chronicle), "remembers him as an officer much respected and beloved, of elegant and commanding appearance, and unquestioned bravery."

The Jewett Family In The War Of The Revolution

Captain Joseph Jewett, Lyme, Conn. (Nathan, Joseph, Capt. Joseph, Joseph, Edward).

Was an officer in the militia: Ensign, 1768; Lieutenant, 1772; Captain, 1775. His services in the war of the Revolution began early, for he was among the men of Lyme "who marched for the relief of Boston on the Lexington alarm, April 19, 1775: Number of days in service, 31."

He was commissioned Captain in Col. Jedidiah Huntington's regiment, 6 July, 1775; discharged, 10 Dec. 1775; continued in service, ——— 1776. He was mortally wounded at the battle of Long Island, 27 August, 1776; and died 31 August, 1776. (Official Record, Adjutant General's Office, Hartford, Conn.)

The manner in which he received the wounds which caused his death has been the subject of much discussion. It was long a tradition that he was murdered by the British officer to whom he surrendered his sword; and that was seemingly confirmed by historical authority worthy of credence. Bancroft's History of the United States, Vol. IX, page 92, Edition 1875, says: "Jewett of Lyme, Captain of Volunteers, after surrender was run through the body by the Officer to whom he gave his sword." Caulkins' History of New London, Conn., says: "He was taken prisoner at Flatbush, August 31, 1776, and barbarously slain with his own sword after he had surrendered." These statements were beyond doubt made upon what was then deemed reliable and satisfactory evidence. Later developments, however, show that the story so far as the act of the British officer was concerned is untrue.

In "Johnston's Campaign of 1876 Around New York and Brooklyn," published by the Long Island Historical Society, there appears the statement of Lieutenant Jabez Fitch of Captain Jewett's company, and who was taken prisoner about the same time. The original of the statement was at the time of publication in the possession of Mr. C. J. Bushnell of New York. It may be found in Part 3, page 167, et seq., and is, in part, as follows:

"myself was so happy as to fall into ye . . . hands of . . . 57 Regt. who used me with some degree of Civility; altho some particular offrs were very liberal of their favourite Term (Rebels) & now & then did not forget to Remind me of a Halter &c, they did not Rob or Strip me of my Clothing; only took my Arms & Ammunition, & after keeping me in ye Field sometime, in Confinement with several others under a Strong Guard, was sent off to Genll Grant's Quarters, at Gowaynes. (Gowanus) In this March we Pass'd through ye Front of several Brigades of Hessians who were peraded on several Eminences in Order of Battle; they Indeed made a very Warlike appearance & as no power appeared at ye time to appose them their whole attention seemed to be fixed on us; nor were they by any means sparing of their Insults; but their Offrs especially Represented to ye Life (as far as

senior warden and treasurer of St. Paul's Church of Bakersfield. He was a benefactor to many, being a friend to the weak and helpless.

The account of Charles E. Jewett's untimely and heroic death is given below as it appeared in the San Francisco News Letter in June 1892:

"The telegraph gave meager details the other day of the tragic death, near Bakersfield, of Charles E. Jewett, who lost his life in the rapids of the Kern River in the vain effort to rescue two youths, the only sons of their widowed mother, who had accidentally fallen into the stream. Mr. Jewett saw the disaster, heard the agonizing screams of the heartbroken mother, who saw her loved ones swept to death, and without a thought of the consequences to himself, or of the almost certain futility of attempting the rescue, he jumped into the foaming, dashing rapids, and was carried in a moment into eternity with his two hapless companions.

"It takes but few words to tell the tale, but can any one estimate the height of heroism, the depth of despair displayed and felt there on the rocky banks of that cruel river? What honor is too great to pay to the memory of such a man?

"Reading of his gallant act, one is prepared to know that he was a brave soldier, fought from the beginning to the end of the war under the stars and stripes, and that when his mangled remains were discovered, kind hands removed from them the medal which he had won by his consistent and long-continued bravery.

"He was as modest, too, as he was brave, and of all the people of the town which had been his home for so many years, none could be more illy ppared. On his monument no other epitaph is needed than this: "He gave his life for others."

Ipswich Residents Protested Tea Tax Three Years Earlier

This interesting article appeared in the Ipswich, Mass., Chronicle, Dec. 12, 1973. One Purchiss Jewett was among those signing the petition.

Three years before the Colonists in Boston held their "Tea Party" to protest the tax on tea, Ipswich residents in 1770 voted against use "of that pernicious weed commonly called Tea," according to Ipswich historians.

Residents petitioned the selectmen in February of 1770 to call for a town meeting to vote again the use, import and sale of tea in Ipswich as a protest against the tax. The Boston Tea Party, to be re-enacted as part of the Bicentennial observance this weekend, was held in December of 1773, three years later.

By 1773 many Ipswich residents were growing tired of being tea-less. The novelty of tax rebellion was wearing thin.

Tradition tells us that one defector from the general protest was the wife of General Michael Farley, a deputy to the General Court and later Ipswich's representative to the Provincial Congress.

In Rev. Thomas F. Waters' history of Ipswich he writes, ". . . when the embargo was laid upon tea, and excitement ran high over the tea-ships in Boston harbor, the patriotic Gen. Michael Farley would not allow the hated herb any place in his house, but his good wife craved her soothing cup, and was wont to slip over to her neighbor, Dame Heard, and enjoy with her the forbidden privilege."

The Petition, "translated" by Mrs. Louise Hodgkins and Mrs. Elizabeth Newton, reads as follows:

"To the Select Men of the Town afore sd Gentlement We the Subscribers being freeholders and Inhabitants of Said Town heareby desire you to issue the Warrants and Worn the freeholders and Other Inhabitants of Ipswitch aforesd to Meet at the Town house on Monday the 12 of this instant February at 2 of the Clock P.M. in order to chuse a Moderator and try the mind of the Town by a Vote or Votes weather they will come into any Salutory Method to Prevent the use of that Pernitious weed commonly called Tea and also to Not Purchase any goods of those who continue to import & Refuse to com into the Salutory Agreement of the Merchants and Other who are wortherly Preferring the Good of their Country to their Private interest and Pass any Vote or Votes that may then be thought Proper with regard to either of the peitions afore said."

CORRECTIONS AND ADDITIONS TO THE 1975 YEAR BOOK

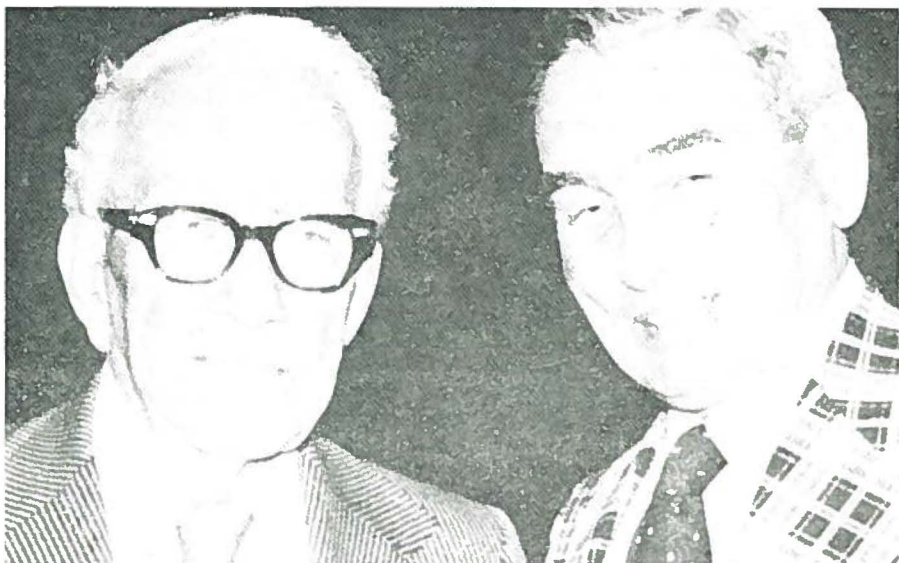
A correction and an addition has been sent concerning the story on Dr. C. Harvey Jewett in the 1975 Year Book.

ence, drafted by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia, was adopted by a committee including John Adams. On July 4, 1776, the Declaration was agreed to, engrossed, signed by John Hancock and sent to the legislatures of the States.

I am sure that as we study the history of the Jewetts of those times, before and after the declaration, we can take great pride. We do indeed have a great heritage.

At the directors' meeting in Shelburne, Vt., last August, it was voted to hold a reunion of the Family in Rowley on June 26, 1976. We hope to have a program of interest and value to all. The plans for the reunion are being worked out. A special mailing has been made in order that you may plan well ahead.

Again at the Shelburne meeting, there was discussion on the question of updating and indexing the family records. In October last, I received a letter from Roger Jewett, Past President and director for life, with an offer to head up a committee to study the whole procedure involved. Let me at once give, in the name of Jewett Family, a special vote of thanks to our Director John Jewett Gilbert for his labor and advice on this project. While John was unable to attend the meeting at Shelburne he sent to us a complete set of revised by-laws. From this excellent work by John, the full board was able to work out a new set of by-laws and the board adopted the same. The recommendations by John were indeed of great value.

We again urge that you read and study the Jewett Year Book. It is a source of knowledge and information to us all, and on a nation-wide basis. Under the capable direction of our Editor (and director) Dorothy Jewett Stitt, it continues to have style and purpose.

Please keep your address up to date with the Sec.-Treas. With postal rates being what they are, this is most important. As you know, our income depends in large part on dues of members. A prompt remittance is most welcome.

Now please, this personal note. With my election as President at Williamsburg in 1974, and re-election at Shelburne, 1975, there came, and continues, to Mrs. Haley and myself, a deep sense of appreciation and pride in the confidence expressed by your Board of Directors. The Jewett Family of America can, and I believe will continue to serve and inform. Let us remember the words found in the Psalms, 16:6:

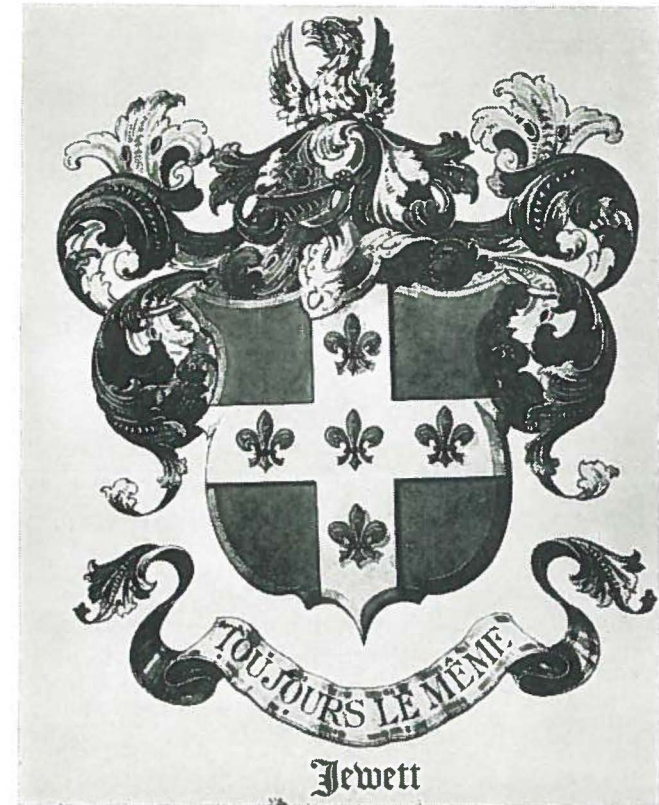
AMERICA, YOU CAN DO IT, you have before:
